

This Installation, Operation, and Maintenance Manual is designed to help you achieve the best performance and longest life from your Gorman-Rupp pump.

This pump is a 10 Series, semi-open impeller, self-priming centrifugal model with a suction check valve. The pump is designed to handle most most non-volatile, non-flammable liquids containing specified entrained solids. The pump is close-coupled to a 1 1/2 HP, single phase, dual voltage, totally enclosed fan-cooled electric motor. The basic material of construction for wetted parts is gray iron, with steel wearing parts and stainless steel motor shaft.

#### INSTALLATION - SECTION B

Since pump installations are seldom identical, this section offers only general recommendations and practices required to inspect, position, and arrange the pump and piping.

Most of the information pertains to a standard **static lift application** where the pump is positioned above the free level of liquid to be pumped.

If installed in a **flooded suction application** where the liquid is supplied to the pump under pressure, some of the information such as mounting, line configuration, and priming must be tailored to the specific application. Since the pressure supplied to the pump is critical to performance and safety, **be sure** to limit the incoming pressure to 50% of the maximum permissible operating pressure as shown on the pump performance curve.

#### **Pump Dimensions**




Figure 1. Pump Model 11 1/2A3-E1.5 1P

Section B.

#### PREINSTALLATION INSPECTION

The pump assembly was inspected and tested before shipment from the factory. Before installation, inspect the pump for damage which may have occurred during shipment. Check as follows:

- a. Inspect the pump and motor for cracks, dents, damaged threads, and other obvious damage.
- b. Check for and tighten loose attaching hardware. Since gaskets tend to shrink after drying, check for loose hardware at mating surfaces.
- c. Carefully read all tags, decals, and markings on the pump assembly, and follow the instructions indicated.
- d. Check all lubricant levels and lubricate as necessary. Refer to LUBRI-CATION in the MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR section of this manual and perform duties as instructed.
- e. If the pump and motor have been stored for more than 12 months, some of the components or lubricants may have exceeded their maximum shelf life. These must be inspected or replaced to ensure maximum pump service.

If the maximum shelf life on any itemhas been exceeded, or if anything appears to be abnormal, contact your Gorman-Rupp distributor or the factory to determine the repair or updating policy. **Do not** put the pump into service until appropriate action has been taken.

#### POSITIONING PUMP

#### Lifting

Use lifting equipment with a capacity of at least **500 pounds**. This pump weighs approximately **96 pounds**, not including the weight of accessories and base. Customer installed equipment such as suction and discharge piping **must** be removed before attempting to lift.

#### CAUTION

The pump assembly can be seriously damaged if the cables or chains used to lift and move the unit are improperly wrapped around the pump.

#### Mounting

Locate the pump in an accessible place as close as practical to the liquid being pumped. Level mounting is essential for proper operation. The pump may have to be supported or shimmed to provide for level operation or to eliminate vibration.

#### Clearance

A minimum clearance of 18 inches in front of the cover plate is required to permit removal of the cover and easy access to the pump interior.

#### SUCTION AND DISCHARGE PIPING

#### Materials

Either pipe or hose may be used for suction and discharge lines; however, the materials must be compatible with the liquid being pumped. If hose is used in suction lines, it must be the rigid-wall, reinforced type to prevent collapse under suction. Using piping couplings in suction lines is not recommended.

#### Line Configuration

Keep suction and discharge lines as straight as possible to minimize friction losses. Make minimum use of elbows and fittings, which substantially increase friction loss. If elbows are necessary, use the long-radius type to minimize friction loss.

#### Connections to Pump

Before tightening a connecting flange, align it exactly with the pump port. Never pull a pipe line into place by tightening the flange bolts and/or couplings.

Lines near the pump must be independently supported to avoid strain on the pump which could cause excessive vibration, decreased bearing life, and increased shaft and seal wear. If hose-type lines are used, they should have adequate support to secure them when filled with liquid and under pressure.

#### Gauges

Most pumps are drilled and tapped for installing discharge pressure and vacuum suction gauges. If these gauges are desired for pumps that are not tapped, drill and tap the suction and discharge lines not less than 18 inches from the suction and discharge ports and install the lines. Installation closer to the pump may result in erratic readings.

#### SUCTION LINES

To avoid air pockets which could affect pump priming, the suction line must be as short and direct as possible. When operation involves a suction lift, the line must always slope upward to the pump from the source of the liquid being pumped; if the line slopes down to the pump at any point along the suction run, air pockets will be created.

#### **Fittings**

Suction lines should be the same size as the pump inlet. If reducers are used in suction lines, they should be the eccentric type, and should be installed with the flat part of the reducers uppermost to avoid creating air pockets. Valves are not normally used in suction lines, but if a valve is used, install it with the stem horizontal to avoid air pockets.

#### Strainers

If a strainer is furnished with the pump, be certain to use it; any spherical solids which pass through a strainer furnished with the pump will also pass through the pump itself.

If a strainer is not furnished with the pump, but is installed by the pump user, make certain that the total area of the openings in the strainer is at least three or four times the cross section of the suction line, and that the openings will not permit passage of solids larger than the solids handling capability of the pump.

This pump is designed to handle up to 1 inch diameter spherical solids.

#### Sealing

Since even a slight leak will affect priming, head, and capacity, especially when operating with a high suction lift, all connections in the suction line should be sealed with pipe dope to ensure an airtight seal. Follow the sealant manufacturer's recommendations when selecting and applying the pipe dope. The pipe dope should be compatible with the liquid being pumped.

#### Suction Lines In Sumps

If a single suction line is installed in a sump, it should be positioned away from the wall of the sump at a distance equal to one and one-half times the diameter of the suction line.

If there is a liquid flow from an open pipe into the sump, the flow should be kept away from the suction inlet because the inflow will carry air down into the sump, and air entering the suction line will reduce pump efficiency.

If it is necessary to position inflow close to the suction inlet, install a baffle between the inflow and the suction inlet at a distance one and one-half times the diameter of the suction pipe. The baffle will allow entrained air to escape from the liquid before it is drawn into the suction inlet.

If two suction lines are installed in a single sump, the flow paths may interact, reducing the efficiency of one or both pumps. To avoid this, position the suction inlets so that they are separated by a distance equal to at least three times the diameter of the suction pipe.

#### Suction Line Positioning




Figure 2. Recommended Minimum Suction Line Submergence Vs. Velocity

The depth of submergence of the suction line is critical to efficient pump operation. Figure 2 shows recommended minimum submergence vs. velocity.

#### NOTE

The pipe submergence required may be reduced by installing a standard pipe increaser fitting at the end of the suction line. The larger opening size will reduce the inlet velocity. Calculate the required submergence using the following formula based on the increased opening size (area or diameter).

#### DISCHARGE LINES

#### Siphoning

Do not terminate the discharge line at a level lower than that of the liquid being pumped unless a siphon breaker is used in the line. Otherwise, a siphoning action causing damage to the pump could result.

#### **Valves**

A check valve in the discharge line is normally recommended, but it is not necessary in low discharge head applications.

If a throttling valve is desired in the discharge line, use a valve as large as the largest pipe to minimize friction losses. Never install a throttling valve in a suction line.

With high discharge heads, it is recommended that a throttling valve and a system check valve be installed in the discharge line to protect the pump from excessive shock pressure and reverse rotation when it is stopped.

#### Bypass Lines

If it is necessary to permit the escape of air to atmosphere during initial priming or in the repriming cycle, install a bypass line between the pump and the discharge check valve. The bypass line should be sized so that it does not affect pump discharge capacity.

Either a Gorman-Rupp automatic air release valve - which will automatically open to allow the pump to prime, and automatically close when priming is accomplished - or a hand-operated shutoff valve should be installed in the bypass line.

#### NOTE

The bypass line may clog frequently, particularly if the valve remains closed. If this condition occurs, either use a larger bypass line or leave the shutoff valve open during the pumping operation.

Do not terminate the discharge line at a level lower than that of the liquid being pumped unless a siphon breaker is used in the line. Otherwise, a siphoning action could result, causing damage to the pump.

## **ELECTRICAL CONNECTIONS**

Before connecting the motor to the incomming power, check that the electrical service available matches the pump motor requirements stamped on the motor name-plate.



#### OPERATION - SECTION C



#### CAUTION

Pump speed and operating condition points must be within the continuous performance range shown on the curve. (See Section E, Page 1.)

#### PRIMING

Install the pump and piping as described in INSTALLATION. Make sure that the piping connections are tight, and that the pump is securely mounted. Check that the pump is properly lubricated (see LUBRICATION in MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR).

This pump is self-priming, but the pump should never be operated unless there is liquid in the casing.

#### CAUTION

Never operate a self-priming pump unless there is liquid in the casing. The pump will not prime when dry. Extended operation of a dry pump will destroy the seal assembly.

Add liquid to the pump casing when:

- The pump is being put into service for the first time.
- 2. The pump has not been used for a considerable length of time.
- The liquid in the pump casing has evaporated.

Once the pump casing has been filled, the pump will prime and reprime as necessary.

To fill the pump, remove the pump casing fill cover or fill plug at the top of the casing and add clean liquid until the pump is filled. Replace the fill cover or fill plug before operating the pump.

#### STARTING

Consult the operations manual furnished with the motor.

#### **OPERATION**

Lines With a Bypass

Either a Gorman-Rupp automatic air release valve or a hand operated shutoff valve may be installed in a bypass line.

If a Gorman-Rupp automatic air release valve has been installed, close the throttling valve in the discharge line. The Gorman-Rupp valve will automatically open to allow the pump to prime, and automatically close when priming has been accomplished. After the pump has been primed, and liquid is flowing steadily from the bypass line, open the discharge throttling valve.

If a hand operated shutoff valve has been installed, close the throttling valve in the discharge line, and open the bypass shutoff valve so that the pump will not have to prime against the weight of the liquid in the discharge line. When the pump has been primed, and liquid is flowing steadily from the bypass line, close the bypass shutoff valve and open the discharge throttling valve.

#### Lines Without a Bypass

Open all valves in the discharge line and start the power source. Priming is indicated by a positive reading on the discharge pressure gauge or by a quieter operation. The pump may not prime immediately because the suction line must first fill with liquid. If the pump fails to prime within five minutes, stop it and check the suction line for leaks.

After the pump has been primed, partially close the discharge line throttling valve in order to fill the line slowly and guard against excessive shock pres-

sure which could damage pipe ends, gaskets, sprinkler heads, and any other fixtures connected to the line. When the discharge line is completely filled, adjust the throttling valve to the required flow rate.


#### Leakage

No leakage should be visible at pump mating surfaces, or at pump connections or fittings. Keep all line connections and fittings tight to maintain maximum pump efficiency.

#### Liquid Temperature And Overheating

The maximum liquid temperature for this pump is  $160^{\circ}$  F. Do not apply it at a higher operating temperature.

Overheating can occur if operated with the valves in the suction or discharge lines closed. Operating against closed valves could bring the liquid to a boil, build pressure, and cause the pump to rupture or explode. If overheating occurs, stop the pump and allow it to cool before servicing it. Refill the pump casing with cool liquid.



#### Strainer Check

If a suction strainer has been shipped with the pump or installed by the user, check the strainer regularly, and clean it as necessary. The strainer should also be checked if pump flow rate begins to drop. If a vacuum suction gauge has been installed, monitor and record the readings regularly to detect strainer blockage.

**Never** introduce air or steam pressure into the pump casing or piping to remove a blockage. This could result in personal injury or damage to the equipment. If backflushing is absolutely necessary, **liquid pressure** must be limited to 50% of the maximum permissible operating pressure shown on the pump performance curve.

#### Pump Vacuum Check

With the pump inoperative, install a vacuum gauge in the system, using pipe dope on the threads. Block the suction line and start the pump. At operating speed the pump should pull a vacuum of 20 inches or more of mercury. If it does not, check for air leaks in the seal, gasket, or discharge valve.

Open the suction line, and read the vacuum gauge with the pump primed and at operating speed. Shut off the pump. The vacuum gauge reading will immediately drop proportionate to static suction lift, and should then stabilize. If the vacuum reading falls off rapidly after stabilization, an air leak exists. Before checking for the source of the leak, check the point of installation of the vacuum gauge.

#### **STOPPING**

Never halt the flow of liquid suddenly. If the liquid being pumped is stopped abruptly, damaging shock waves can be transmitted to the pump and piping system. Close all connecting valves slowly.

After stopping the pump, disconnect incoming power to the motor and lock it out to ensure that the pump will remain inoperative.

#### Cold Weather Preservation

In below freezing conditions, drain the pump to prevent damage from freezing. Also, clean out any solids by flushing with a hose. Operate the pump for approximately one minute; this will remove any remaining liquid that could freeze the pump rotating parts.

If the pump will be idle for more than a few hours, or if it has been pumping liquids containing a large amount of solids, drain the pump, and flush it thoroughly with clean water. To prevent large solids from clogging the drain port and preventing the pump from completely draining, insert a rod or stiff wire in the drain port, and agitate the liquid during the draining process. Clean out any remaining solids by flushing with a hose.








Figure 1. Pump Model 11 1/2A3-E1.5 1P

#### PUMP AND SEAL DISASSEMBLY AND REASSEMBLY




Figure 2. S1575 Seal Assembly

This pump requires little service due to its rugged, minimum-maintenance design. However, if it becomes necessary to inspect or replace the wearing parts, follow these instructions which are keyed to the sectional view(s) (see Figures 1 and 2) and the accompanying parts list(s).

Before attempting to service the pump, disconnect incoming power to the motor and lock it out to ensure that the motor will remain inoperative and close all valves in the suction and discharge lines.

For motor disassembly and repair, consult the literature supplied with the motor, or contact your local motor representative.

## Suction Check Valve Removal And Disassembly

Before attempting to service the pump, remove the casing drain plug (24) and drain the pump. Clean and reinstall the drain plug.

Remove the nuts (39) and separate the suction flange (40) and check valve assembly (32) from the pump casing (1). Inspect the check valve parts and replace as required. To disassemble the check valve assembly, remove the machine screw and lockwasher (36 and 37), and separate the valve weights (34 and 35) and check valve gasket (33).

#### Back Cover Removal

The wear plate (23) is easily accessible and may be serviced by removing the back cover (26). Loosen the clamp bar screw (31) and remove the clamp bar (30). Pull the back cover from the casing. Remove the back cover gasket (25) and clean the mating surfaces.

Inspect the wear plate for excessive wear or scoring. If replacement is required, remove the hardware (27 and 28) securing it to the back cover.

#### Pump Disassembly

Remove the hardware securing the pump casing to the base.

Remove the nuts (14) and slide the casing off the intermediate (11). Remove the gasket set (22) from the casing studs. Tie and tag the gasket set for ease of reassembly.

To remove the impeller (2), immobilize the motor shaft, and tap the vanes with a soft-faced mallet or block of wood in a counterclockwise direction (when facing the impeller). Be careful not to damage the impeller vanes. Use caution when unscrewing the impeller from the shaft; tension on the seal spring will be released as the impeller is removed.

Remove the impeller adjusting shims (12). Tie and tag the shims for ease of reassembly.

#### Seal Removal

#### (Figures 1 and 2)

Remove the spring centering washer (10) and seal spring. Slide the shaft sleeve (16) and rotating portion of the seal off the shaft as a unit. Apply oil to the sleeve and work it under the bellows. Slide the rotating portion of the seal off the sleeve.

To remove the stationary seat and element, remove the hardware (20 and 21), and slide the stationary portion of the seal and intermediate (11) off the shaft as a unit. Position the intermediate on a flat surface with the impeller side down. Use thumb pressure to press the stationary seat and element from the intermediate.

Remove the slinger ring from the shaft.

If no further disassembly is required, see Seal Installation.

#### Seal Installation

#### (Figures 1 and 2)

Clean the seal cavity and shaft with a cloth soaked in fresh cleaning solvent.

The seal is not normally reused because wear patterns on the finished faces cannot be realigned during reassembly. This could result in premature failure. If necessary to reuse an old seal in an emergency, **carefully** wash all metallic parts in fresh cleaning solvent and allow to dry thoroughly.

Handle the seal parts with extreme care to prevent damage. Be careful not to contaminate precision finished faces; even fingerprints on the faces can shorten seal life. If necessary, clean the faces with a non-oil based solvent and a clean lint free tissue. Wipe lightly in a concentric pattern to avoid scratching the faces.

Inspect the seal components for wear, scoring, grooves, and other damage that might cause leakage. Clean and polish the shaft sleeve, or replace it if there are nicks or cuts on either end. If any components are worn, replace the complete seal; never mix old and new seal parts.

If a replacement seal is being used, remove it from the container and inspect the precision finished faces to ensure that they are free of any foreign matter.

To ease installation of the seal, lubricate the 0-rings and shaft sleeve (16) with water or a very **small** amount of oil, and apply a drop of light lubricating oil on the finished faces. Assemble the seal as follows, (see Figure 2).

#### CAUTION

This seal is not designed for operation at temperatures above 160°F. Do not use at higher operating temperatures.

Slide the slinger ring (19) onto the shaft. Install the stationary element in the seat and press this stationary subassembly into the intermediate until fully seated. After installation, wipe the sealing face lightly in a concentric pattern with a clean, lint-free tissue.

Position the intermediate and stationary subassembly over the shaft and secure it to the motor with the hardware (20 and 21).

Slide the rotating subassembly (consisting of the rotating element, bellows and retainer) over the lubricated shaft sleeve until the rotating element is just flush with the chamfered end of the sleeve. Slide the sleeve over the shaft until the sealing faces contact. Continue to press the shaft sleeve through the seal assembly until it seats squarely against the shaft shoulder.

Install the seal spring and spring centering washer (10).

#### Pump Reassembly

Inspect the impeller, and replace it if cracked or badly eroded.

Install the same thickness of impeller adjusting shims (12) as previously removed, and screw the impeller onto the shaft until tight. A clearance of .020 to .040 inch between the impeller and the intermediate is necessary for maximum pump efficiency. Measure this clearance, and add or subtract impeller shims until it is reached.

Install the same thickness of pump casing gaskets (22), as previously removed and secure the pump casing to the intermediate with the nuts (14). Do not fully tighten the nuts until the impeller face clearance has been set.

#### NOTE

If the pump has been completely disassembled, it is recommended that the back cover assembly be reinstalled at this time. The back cover assembly must be in place to adjust the impeller face clearance.

A clearance of .008 to .015 inch between the impeller and the wear plate assembly is also recommended for maximum pump efficiency. This clearance can be obtained by adding or subtracting gaskets in the casing gasket set until the impeller binds against the wear plate when the shaft is turned. After the impeller binds, add approximately .012 inch of gaskets.

Secure the pump casing to the base with the previously removed hardware. Be sure to reinstall any leveling shims used under the casing mounting feet.

#### Back Cover Installation

If the wear plate was removed for replacement, carefully center it on the back cover and secure it with the hardware (27 and 28). The wear plate must be concentric to prevent binding when the back cover is installed.

Clean any scale or debris from the contacting surfaces in the pump casing that might interfere or prevent a good seal with the back cover.

Replace the back cover gasket (25) and slide the back cover (26) into the pump casing.

#### NOTE

To ease future disassembly, apply a film of grease of 'Never-Seez' on the back cover shoulder, or any surface which contacts the pump casing. This action will reduce rust and scale build-up.

Secure the back cover assembly with the clamp bar (30) and clamp bar screw (31). Be sure the wear plate does not bind against the impeller.

# Suction Check Valve Reassembly And Installation

Assemble the valve weights to each side of the check valve gasket (33) and secure the parts with the round head machine screw and lockwasher (36 and 37).

Position the check valve assembly in the suction port with the large weight (34) toward the impeller and the small weight (35) toward the suction flange (40). Install the suction flange, and secure the complete assembly with the nuts (39).

Check the operation of the suction check valve to ensure proper seating and free movement. Reinstall the suction and discharge piping.

Before starting the pump, check that the piping is secure, fill the casing with liquid, and open all valves in the suction and discharge lines.

#### LUBRICATION

#### Seal Assembly

The seal assembly is lubricated by the medium being pumped, and no additional lubrication is required.

Consult the literature supplied with the motor, or contact your local motor representative.
